Dear Social Studies Educator,

When I returned to school in the late 1990's to become a "history teacher," I quickly learned that "social studies" was so much more. My methods instructor, Dr. Susie Burroughs, told us on the first day of class that the job of a social studies teacher was to produce good citizens, and the National Council for the Social Studies defines social studies as "the integrated study of the social sciences and humanities to promote civic competence." I have tried to keep these things in mind while promoting social studies in my school, community, and throughout the state.

Although each of us has our favorite social studies subject, social studies encompasses so much more than "just" history, "just" geography, or "just" economics. I think it is so important that we are advocates for the social studies as an inclusive discipline. In order for social studies to be recognized as the important part of the curriculum that it is, we must make it clear

that social studies is a core discipline that will stimulate interest in academics and prepare students for their roles as global citizens.

As a member of the Mississippi Council for the Social Studies, you are taking an active role in social studies education, and I thank you on behalf of the entire organization. I want to encourage you to continue to be active in MCSS. The organization is your voice to address issues that affect social studies educators in Mississippi.

Please make your plans to attend this year's annual conference at the Silver Star Resort in Choctaw on October 19-20. The entire board and conference committees have been hard at work coordinating what we hope will be the most resourceful conference ever. The Mississippi Council for the Social Studies invites nominations of educators to be considered for the 2009 Jesse Palmer Social Studies Educator of the Year Award. Established in the memory of Dr. Jesse Palmer, this award is given each year to an educator who demonstrates exemplary knowledge, skills, and dispositions in promoting quality social studies education in Mississippi schools.

To be considered for this award, an educator must have at least three years of teaching experience, be currently involved in a social studies-related profession, and submit an application packet that includes the following:

I. Vita

- A. Name and contact information (address, phone number, e-mail)
- B. Current and past education-related employment
- C. Educational background (degrees held, specialized training, other)
- D. Positions of leadership held (professional, civic, other)
- E. Honors and awards received
- F. Participation in professional organizations (memberships, service, other)
- G. Workshops, seminars, professional development of note (organized, presented, attended)
- H. Other relevant information as deemed appropriate

II. Questionnaire (Answer each of the following in a paragraph or more.)

- A. Why did you choose to become a professional educator?
- B. What is your philosophy of teaching?
- C. What is your approach to social studies education?
- D. In what ways do you "go above and beyond" to be the best professional you can be?

III. Supporting Documentation

- A. Letter of recommendation from a current supervisor
- B. Letter of recommendation from a current colleague
- C. Letter of recommendation from a current or former student


