MCSS' annual conference will be held at Mississippi State University's Riley Center in Meridian October 14-15. The Center houses Meridian's historic Grand Opera House, one of only a dozen or so ever constructed in the world. The conference happily coincides with Meridian's sesquicentennial anniversary with the added plus of myriad historical sites in the area.

The Sam Dale State Park is the burial site for Mississippian, Major General Samuel Dale, prototype for both Kentucky's Daniel Boone and Tennessee's Davy Crockett.

Another state landmark is Stuckey's Bridge across the Chunky River. Nearby is Dunn's Falls where a certain haberdasher by the name of John B. Stetson got his start.

The only two gristmills extant in the state are located near Meridian and corn is regularly ground on Saturdays.

The city has an excellent museum of art and is home to the oldest continuously operated restaurant in the state. There is a pictorial display at the airport honoring the Key Brothers, aviation pioneers in the state.

At present, tours are set for The Jimmie Rodgers Museum, The Denzel Carousel, and the Merrehope and Williams homes. Others are in the making.

Jimmie Rodgers is the Father of Country Music and the *ONLY* musician who was voted into four national music halls of fame (Country, Rock and Roll, Songwriters and Blues).

The Denzel Carousel is the only one in operation in the entire world. Thirty-seven horses are spotted around the city in his honor. Both the Merrehope (c. 1858) which survived Sherman's Campaign and Williams (1886) are tour homes with ghost stories.

Rose Hill Cemetery is the interment site for the city founders and countless characters of repute including the King and Queen of the Gypsies. We are in for an extra special treat on Thursday evening as some two dozen costumed storytellers regale us with their "Tales from the Crypt."

The Drury Inn and Suites has offered us a group rate. All rooms include free broadband access, one-hour free long-distance telephone usage, a full breakfast, and hot snacks with beverages from 5:30 – 7:00 pm. Your group reservation number will be furnished upon receipt of your conference registration and payment.

Meridian gives us the chance to combine business and pleasure by providing a fun and exciting experience for all, together with the opportunity to secure _____ professional development ceu's. There will be breakout sessions especially geared to our sister organizations, the Mississippi Geographic Alliance and the Mississippi Council for Economic Education. There will also be sessions for gifted teachers.






KEYNOTE SPEAKER

Founder and CEO of Peavey Electronics, Mr. Hartley Peavey, will be our keynote speaker. Mr. Peavey is a native of Meridian and a product of Meridian Public Schools. The 1965 MSU grad now heads up one of the largest privately owned businesses in the state. With 31 plants in the state of Mississippi employing over 2000 people, there is also a Peavey plant in Corby, England.

Mr. Peavey's formative years came during the '50s where he was very much a product of the times. Beginning with the advent of Ike Turner and Rock and Roll, and continuing through the Elvis years, his life was forever changed when he attended a Bo Diddley concert in Laurel in 1957. He says, "From that time I always wanted to be a guitar player." Begging his father for an electric guitar, he was told that it would become a consideration only after he learned to play.



Many of the world's foremost Musicians—from to Van Halen, Ted Nugent and Lynyard Skynyrd to Marty Stuart, Merle Haggard, and The Kenny Chestney Band—use Peavey guitars, sound systems and other equipment.



Being an impatient teenager and unwilling to wait, he modified a classic guitar to accept steel strings and built his own pickup because he couldn't afford one. Next he asked his dad for an amplifier. Given the same answer, he did what any red-blooded would-be guitarist would do—he built his own. Driven by the lack of affordable guitars, amps and sound equipment, he decided then and there "to build the best musical equipment possible at fair and reasonable prices."

He began Peavey Electronics in 1965, and, the rest, as they say, is history.

A multi-award winner across the margent of the music field including the musical industry's highest honor—the coveted Musicmesse International Press Award's Lifetime Achievement Award, Mr. Peavey heads one of the largest and most diversified manufacturers of professional music instruments and audio equipment. In its 45th year, the Meridian, Mississippi based company boasts a product line of more than 2000 components distributed in more than 130 countries.

"Our goal," states Mr. Peavey, "was (and still is) 'to be the best,' even though that means being different."

MISSISSIPPI COUNCIL FOR THE SOCIAL STUDIES THE JESSE PALMER SOCIAL STUDIES EDUCATOR OF THE YEAR AWARD

Established in memory of Dr. Jesse Palmer, this award is given annually to an educator who demonstrates exemplary knowledge, skills, and dispositions in promoting quality social studies education.

To be considered for this award, an educator must have at least three years of teaching experience, be currently involved in a social studies-related profession, and submit an application packet that includes the following:

- I. Vitae: name and contact information, current and past education-related employment, educational background, positions of leadership held, honors and awards received, participation in professional organizations, workshops, seminars.
- II. Questionnaire (Answer each of the following in a paragraph or more.) Why you chose to become a professional educator, your philosophy of teaching, and in what ways you "go above and beyond" to be the best professional you can be
- III. Supporting Documentation: Letters of recommendation from (1) current supervisor, (2) a current colleague, and (3) a current or former student

To be considered as an award recipient for this calendar year, application packets must be postmarked no later than September 1 and mailed to:
