Notable Social Studies Trade Books for Young People

Now that the Common Core Standards have been adopted and a timeline set for their implementation in Mississippi schools, literacy education is being emphasized in K-12 curriculum and instruction—not just in language arts classrooms but in all classrooms, including socials studies classrooms. Using trade books as a resource that center on social studies content is an effective approach for integrating supplementary reading into social studies units of instruction. The question for teachers, however, is how to locate high quality, developmentally appropriate books for their students.

The National Council for the Social Studies (NCSS) has the answer to this question! The NCSS Book Review Committee, in cooperation with the Children's Book Council (CBC), has since 1972 developed an annual annotated bibliography of social studies themed books for young people.

Members of the committee read hundreds of books each year, selecting only those that meet the criteria set forth by the NCSS and the CBC. Books that appear on the list must meet one or more of the following stipulations: have an emphasis on human relations, represent diverse groups, be sensitive to cultural experiences, present an original theme or a new approach to a

The list developed by the committee provides teachers the information needed to determine which books would be appropriate for their students. The list also includes information about the publishers of the books and how copies may be obtained. Book titles are categorized by subject matter, and the books are correlated by their subject matter to the themes set forth in the NCSS National Curriculum Standards for Social Studies. The Notable Trade Books for Young People list is published each year as an insert to the May/June issue of Social Education, a leading publication of NCSS. Subscription to Social Education is one of several member benefits offered to educators who join NCSS. Back orders of the journal may be purchased by nonmembers. Additionally, most collegiate and university libraries in the state hold institutional memberships to the journal, so check your local or online libraries holdings for copies of the most recent "Notables" lists.


National Council for the Social Studies to Hold Annual Conference in Washington, D.C.

The Mississippi Council for the Social Studies invites nominations of educators to be considered for the 2011 Jesse Palmer Social Studies Educator of the Year Award. Established in the memory of Dr. Jesse Palmer, this award is given each year to an educator who demonstrates exemplary knowledge, skills, and dispositions in promoting quality social studies education in Mississippi schools. To be considered for this award, an educator must have at least three years of teaching experience, be currently involved in a social studies-related profession, and submit an application packet that includes the following:

I. Vita

- A. Name and contact information (address, phone number, e-mail)
- B. Current and past education-related employment
- C. Educational background (degrees held, specialized training, other)
- D. Positions of leadership held (professional, civic, other)
- E. Honors and awards received
- F. Participation in professional organizations (memberships, service, other)
- G. Workshops, seminars, professional development of note (organized, presented, attended)
- H. Other relevant information as deemed appropriate

II. Questionnaire (Answer each of the following in a paragraph or more.)

- A. Why did you choose to become a professional educator?
- B. What is your philosophy of teaching?
- C. What is your approach to social studies education?
- D. In what ways do you "go above and beyond" to be the best professional you can be?

III. Supporting Documentation

- A. Letter of recommendation from a current supervisor
- B. Letter of recommendation from a current colleague
- C. Letter of recommendation from a current or former student



He has worked for several newspapers, including the Clarksdale Press Register, the News-Journal in Wilmington, Delaware, and the Boston Globe from 1975-2000 where he was a national and foreign correspondent. He has been a member of the Ole Miss Journalism faculty for the past 10 years, and serves as a fellow at the Overby Center for Southern Journalism and Politics. He is co-author of *Arkansas Mischief* and the author of Dixie. His most recent work is The Fall of the House of Zeus. which chronicles the rise and fall of Mississippi lawyer Richard "Dickie" Scruggs. Wilkie lives in Oxford and New Orleans.
