The 2007 Mississippi Council for the financial literacy, and identifying Social Studies Fall Conference was held at the Jackson Hilton on October 15-16. The theme of the conference was Crossing Borders, Building Bridges. The two-day event began on Monday morning with an optional preconference clinic for members only. Hosted by the Mississippi Council on Economic Education, the topic of the workshop was U.S. History: Eyes on the Economy.

The conference proper kicked off that afternoon with the General Opening Session. President Jennifer Nance welcomed the group and provided an overview of the program. Attendees were then treated to a special appearance by Marshall Ramsey. The Nobel Prize finalist and syndicated cartoonist with the Clarion-Ledger provided a humorous look at Mississippi politics as depicted in his cartoons.

A number of conference sessions provided information about social studies programs and projects, including We the Jury, We the People, Project Citizen, Virtual Economics, and Civil Rights education in Mississippi. Other sessions offered tips on teaching history creatively, meeting the new geography requirements, teaching student

quality professional development opportunities for social studies teachers. Chauncey Spears, MDE Social Studies Specialist, conducted a session on recent initiatives at the Department.

Hank Holmes. Director of the Mississippi Department of Archives and History, addressed the group during the Tuesday morning plenary session. His presentation focused on the history of the Archives and services it provides to the state. Attendees received a wealth of information concerning resources for classroom teachers.

During the Business Luncheon, MCSS was honored to have Mr. Johnny Franklin as the keynote speaker. Currently serving as the Education Policy Advisor to Governor Haley Barbour, Mr. Franklin shared his thoughts about education in general and social studies education specifically. Other highlights of the conference included Vendor Alley; a reception sponsored by the Mississippi Geographic Alliance; and field trips to the Natural Science Museum, Agricultural Museum, and Sports Hall of Fame.



MISSISSIPPI COUNCIL FOR THE SOCIAL STUDIES THE JESSE PALMER SOCIAL STUDIES EDUCATOR OF THE YEAR AWARD

The Mississippi Council for the Social Studies invites nominations of educators to be considered for the 2008 Jesse Palmer Social Studies Educator of the Year Award. Established in memory of Dr. Jesse Palmer, this award is given each year to an educator who demonstrates exemplary knowledge, skills, and dispositions in promoting quality social studies education in Mississippi schools.

To be considered for this award, an educator must have at least three years of teaching experience, be currently involved in a social studies-related profession, and submit an application packet that includes the following:

I. Vitae

- A. Name and contact information (address, phone number, e-mail)
- B. Current and past education-related employment
- C. Educational background (degrees held, specialized training, other)
- D. Positions of leadership held (professional, civic, other)
- E. Honors and awards received
- F. Participation in professional organizations (memberships, service, other)
- G. Workshops, seminars, professional development of note (organized, presented, attended)
- H. Other relevant information as deemed appropriate

II. Questionnaire (Answer each of the following in a paragraph or more.)

- A. Why did you choose to become a professional educator?
- B. What is your philosophy of teaching?
- C. What is your approach to social studies education?
- D. In what ways do you "go above and beyond" to be the best professional you can be?

III. Supporting Documentation

- A. Letter of recommendation from a current supervisor
- B. Letter of recommendation from a current colleague
- C. Letter of recommendation from a current or former student


